Saint Barnabas Episcopal Church is a part of the Episcopal Diocese of West Texas, the Episcopal Church USA, and the world-wide Anglican Communion.

In 1946, a group of eight Fredericksburg Episcopalians began meeting once a month in one another's homes. In 1952, the parish purchased one of earliest homes in Fredericksburg built by German settler Peter Walter. Walter first built a log cabin on the lot and then began a permanent home of fachwerk construction in 1846. The home was restored as a mission and consecrated by Bishop Everett H. Jones on St. Barnabas Day, December 16, 1954. The home continues to be used as a chapel and sits just a few yards from the new Church. On January 31, 1965, the new St. Barnabas Episcopal Church was consecrated by the Rt. Rev. Everett H. Jones.

Today, St. Barnabas remains a vibrant part of the Fredericksburg community with average Sunday attendance in excess of 200 people worshipping at three different services - 7:45 am (a more traditional spoken service), 9:00 am (a more contemporary service), and 11:00 am (a more contemporary service).

There is a nursery available during our 9:00 am and 11:00 am services. There is also Sunday school available for all ages during the 10:00 hour.

There are opportunities to serve within the Church, in the community, and on world mission trips.

At Saint Barnabas Episcopal Church most of us were not born and raised in Fredericksburg. We've come from different backgrounds, locations, and experiences, but we come together because we've found some things that are important to us... real relationships and a caring community. We've also found something bigger than ourselves — a way to grow a deeper relationship with God. Saint Barnabas is a group of people who come together to share the hope found in Christ Jesus to the world around us. Please join us.
